Postbox

A reminder to all parents:

In the entrance hall there is a red post box in which you can deposit forms and slips rather than queuing to hand them in at the office. Money can also be placed in the box as long as it is in a clearly marked envelope (with your child's name, date and what it is for). The post box is opened daily.

Uniform

Please can you ensure your child is in full school uniform. Children should wear grey trousers/skirts yellow polo shirt and jade cardigan/ sweatshirt and black footwear. Year 6 should wear a white shirt (tucked in) school cardigan and school tie.

Stranger Danger

Please remind your children of the basic 'Stranger Danger' rules which include:

- Never accept gifts or sweets from a stranger
- Never get in a car with a stranger
- Never go anywhere with a stranger
- Never go off on your own without telling your parents or a trusted adult
- Always play with other children
- Walk to school in pairs or groups for safety

Stranger danger is not just about teaching children who or what to avoid but also includes positive rules so that children know how to keep themselves safe.

Harvest Donations

It is Harvest time and the Upper Room are appealing to the generosity of the community to make donations of food and household goods. Please can parents and carers to bring in items to donate and put them onto the display in the school hall. The Upper Room provides a broad range of services for the homeless, vulnerable, socially disadvantaged and ex-offenders of West London and they aim to help people gain enough confidence to get back into the mainstream of society and become self-sufficient.

The charity helps over 1,500 different people every year and serves over 26,000 hot, nutritious meals.

Donations at Harvest and throughout the year are greatly appreciated. Please give generously. Foods with a past sell-by-date cannot be accepted. We prefer tinned food with at least 12 months remaining for consumption.

Tinned Foods: vegetables, fish (salmon or tuna), meat, fruit, tomatoes, tomato puree, pulses

Dry Goods: sugar (preferably granulated or caster), dried herbs, seasonings (esp. stock cubes), pepper, salt, plain flour, powdered potato, lasagne, lentils, chickpeas SWEET biscuits (please not crackers or cheese biscuits)

Other: pasta sauces, olive oil, cooking oil, soya sauce, white wine vinegar

Beverages: instant coffee, tea bags (please NOT loose tea or ground coffee), long life milk, squashes, juices

Cleaning: anti-bacterial hand wash and sanitizer, LARGE strong black garbage and bin liner sacks, rubber gloves (large size), latex/hygiene gloves, washing up liquid, sponges and brushes, kitchen towel and toilet rolls

Clothing: trainers, shoes (good condition), new men's and women's tee-shirts, underwear and socks, winter coats, winter hats, gloves (large), clean casual warm clothing in good condition

Toiletries: disposable razors, shaving foam/gel, toothbrushes and toothpaste, shampoo, body lotions (small sizes), soap, deodorants, pocket-size packets of tissues

Equipment: sleeping bags, blankets, plastic/metal cutlery, soup bowls, cling-film and tin foil (catering size)

They do not need:

breakfast foods (cereal/porridge/jams etc), tinned spaghetti / macaroni & cheese, any wholemeal pasta, spaghetti / cannelloni / unusual sized pastas, chutneys, pickles, chilli sauce, bbq sauce, dried pulses which require soaking, baked beans!

1. How much does it cost? Even though the Cadets are a voluntary organisation we do ask cadets to give a small amount of money to the unit through weekly subscriptions (50p for Juniors and £1 for Seniors). The reason for this is because this will cover some basic expenses in running the Cadets. However if individuals have particular financial difficulties then a resolution can be discussed through with the local coordinator.

2. What equipment do I need? There is no specific equipment you need in order to join the cadets. We provide a uniform to Cadets at no cost – however you will have to provide black shoes/boots. We recommend bringing a pen and pad to write down notes and to take in information when at Cadet meetings/events. When it comes to **camp** you will be required to bring the basics but if you do not possess any of those items talk to the cadet coordinator.

3. Can I just go along and see what it is like? You will need to speak to the Coordinator (Andrew Pidding details overleaf) to arrange to come along.

4. What do Police Cadets do? Police cadets, help and assist in the community by getting involved in stewarding in local events such as career fairs, town shows, carnivals and other local events. We also assist in high profile events such as the London Marathon, Trooping the Colour, Remembrance Day, Charity Events, Film Premieres and Conferences.

We also help crack down on the selling of tobacco, weapons, alcohol, fireworks and other items that are illegally sold to young people. These operations, known as ‘Test Purchase’ are performed by cadets of suitable age along side Trading Standards Officers.

We also help the local Safer Neighbourhood Teams through leaflet drops, crime prevention initiatives, community safety events and street surveys.

Police Cadets are taught basic knowledge in a variety of policing activity. Law for example, definitions of robbery, burglary, theft, public order, Police and Criminal Evidence Act, along with arrest and custody procedures. Also an insight into how to deal with a Road Traffic Collision, first aid, officers safety, conflict

management, the caution, stop & search and stop & account establishing the differences between the two. Additionally, about the history of the police.

We have a big interest in team work within the Cadets, which is why we also practice and perfect the discipline of drill. We take pride in our uniform. As cadets we are taught how to be disciplined and independent on how to clean and maintain high standards in uniform. We present ourselves professionally at events and cadet weekly meetings.

We have the opportunity to take part in 4 **competitions** a year. These are:

- * Annual MPS Cadet Competition at Hendon - which consists of police based and physical scenarios.
- * Thriftwood - a combination of physical and problem solving activities performed as a group.
- * Iron Team - very similar to 'I'm a celebrity get me out of here'.
- * Spring Competition - which again is a physical and problem solving based competition.

As cadets we also have the opportunity to visit different units in the police service, such as Air Support Unit, the Marine Police, the Mounted Branch (Horses) the Firearms unit, Forensic unit. We also take part in the **Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme** and have the opportunity to go on **expeditions**. It enables the young cadets to have a good experience, outside of the inner city and daily life and explore, develop new skills.
